The original photographs in this collection were taken as part of the Gloucestershire 2000 Photographic Archive project. The Society initially decided to photograph 100 'sites and monuments' which had some historic interest so that a record would exist of their nature and condition in the year 2000. The photographers were all volunteers and were given a free hand regarding the photographs that they took subject to the above general principle. The range of photographs taken varied from monuments which were already well recognised for their historic relevance, to items which were not especially significant in themselves but had a particular interest. All the monuments or sites photographed could potentially face at least modifications and at worst threats to their continuing existence over time.. The work was coordinated by Ron Beard and ultimately the volunteers produced more than 250 photographs, from which those you can see in this document were chosen.

The intention at the time was to revisit the selected sites at ten-year intervals and take new photographs. Accordingly, this was done in 2010 (second edition), and for this **third edition** in the period 2019 – 2024. The collection now provides a record of any changes that have occurred over the last twenty years and provides a valuable insight into how historic sites of interest in the Dean area are valued and cared for. Unfortunately, for the second and third editions some of those who took the original photographs are no longer with us, so new volunteers were recruited. All are acknowledged underneath their photographs.

The photographs are presented in themed collections, namely Mines & Quarries, Transport, Industry, Agriculture & Forestry, Religion and Other Buildings & Monuments. A complete index to the collection is also available.

Bilson Gas Works



Bilson Gas Works, Cinderford - The gas works were in operation from 1857 to late 1940s, taken over by Cannop Foundry in 1957. Their name can be found on drain inspection covers throughout the Forest and adjacent regions.

Bright's Corn Mill, Cinderford Bridge



Bright's Corn Mill, Cinderford Bridge - Thomas Brace converted this former coal drying mill to a cornmill in 1818/19 worked for many years by George Bright until bankrupted in 1904.





Dean Heritage Centre



Dean Heritage Centre - At Camp Mill was a King's forge until 1673, rebuilt as a foundry by Samuel Hewlett in early 19th century. Present building erected in 1876 as a corn mill, subsequently leatherboard mill, saw mill and scrap yard until bought in 1981 by Dean Heritage Museum Trust.





Gunns Mill



Gunns Mill - Established by Sir John Winter in 1629, named after William Gunne who lived there earlier. Used for armaments production in the civil war. Described as the finest remaining example of a charcoal blast furnace in the area. Later used as a paper mill. Subject to a preservation order 1968.



Lydbrook Wire Works Site



Lydbrook Wire Works site - Most forge and metal working sites in Lydbrook are now occupied by modern buildings. The wire works were in operation from 1818 to c1895, their barbed wire is reputed to have played an important part in the agricultural history of the American West and the Canadian prairies.




Recladding of some units and a new sign since 2010 indicates more subdividing of the site and underlines the fact that the Watts Group are as much about property management as anything else in 2021.




