The original photographs in this collection were taken as part of the Gloucestershire 2000 Photographic Archive project. The Society initially decided to photograph 100 'sites and monuments' which had some historic interest so that a record would exist of their nature and condition in the year 2000. The photographers were all volunteers and were given a free hand regarding the photographs that they took subject to the above general principle. The range of photographs taken varied from monuments which were already well recognised for their historic relevance, to items which were not especially significant in themselves but had a particular interest. All the monuments or sites photographed could potentially face at least modifications and at worst threats to their continuing existence over time.. The work was coordinated by Ron Beard and ultimately the volunteers produced more than 250 photographs, from which those you can see in this document were chosen.

The intention at the time was to revisit the selected sites at ten-year intervals and take new photographs. Accordingly, this was done in 2010 (second edition), and for this **third edition** in the period 2019 – 2024. The collection now provides a record of any changes that have occurred over the last twenty years and provides a valuable insight into how historic sites of interest in the Dean area are valued and cared for. Unfortunately, for the second and third editions some of those who took the original photographs are no longer with us, so new volunteers were recruited. All are acknowledged underneath their photographs.

The photographs are presented in themed collections, namely Mines & Quarries, Transport, Industry, Agriculture & Forestry, Religion and Other Buildings & Monuments. A complete index to the collection is also available.

Bixslade Tramway



Bixlade Tramway -The best preserved Forest of Dean tramway, a branch to the Severn and Wye Tramway and Railway, completed by 1812, operated until 1946.



Buckshaft Tramway



Buckshaft tramway took iron ore from the Buckshaft mine to the furnaces at Cinderford. Some portions of the tramway were incorporated into roads or remain as tracks. This photograph shows part of the line of the tramway near St White's School.

Bullo Pill Dock



Bullo Pill dock - The harbour was built for exporting coal at the terminus of the 1809 Bullo Pill Railway.

An unusual, masted yacht sailed here from West Indies.

Cookson Terrace was built in 1858-9 by the Severn and Wye Railway Company to house its workers. The larger central building was a hotel until c1970. The terrace was named after the Chairman of the Company, Joseph Cookson.





















The green area on the left is part of the former railway track which was sold off to private owners after the railway ceased operations in the 1960s. To the right is the former tramway track from Lightmoor and Shakemantle mines to Cinderford Furnaces which the railway line replaced.
